CGLR is a collaborative effort by foundations, nonprofit partners, business leaders, government agencies and communities to ensure that more children succeed in school and graduate prepared for life - college, a career, and active citizenship. This initiative

focuses on ensuring children read at grade-level by the end of third grade. Research demonstrates that proficiency in reading by the end of third grade enables students to shift from "Learning to Read to Reading to Learn." Schools cannot do this alone; engaged communities are needed to remove barriers, expand opportunities, and assist parents in fulfilling their roles and responsibilities in the success of their children.

The Broward chapter of Florida Youth SHINE involves traditionally disconnected youth and provides them with advocacy skills, training and a supervised trip to the Florida Capitol in Tallahassee.

RESPITE

Respite is provided to families with children ages 5-13 years old who exhibit intensive behavioral health needs. Programming focuses on reducing family stress and strengthening family functioning by meeting the child's care needs. Children in the program are offered opportunities for growth and development, which enhances the quality of their lives and their families. Programming is offered on Saturdays and Sundays.

The Earned Income Tax Credit (EITC) is a federal anti-poverty program that provides financial assistance for working families. In 2002, the Children's Services Council began promoting EITC through a county-wide public awareness campaign. Since then, over \$500 million has been returned to Broward residents. With the onset of the COVID-19 Pandemic this program has shifted to offer EITC recipients the choice of filing their returns at various, dedicated, on the ground Volunteer Income Tax Assistance (VITA) sites, entirely online, or through a hybrid drop off method, allowing participants to have flexibility. The program now also offers a free VITA hotline to answer any general questions that pertain to the program. Additionally, volunteer opportunities through Hands on Broward exist for those who wish to become IRS-certified volunteer tax preparers.

In 2003, the American Academy of Pediatrics (AAP) published a report that estimated that the risk of infant suffocation increases 20-fold when infants and adults sleep in the same bed. In 2005, the AAP restated that co-sleeping is a growing concern and recommended that infants not share a bed during sleep.

The Safe Sleep Initiative provides low-income families with free GRACO Pack 'n Play® cribs, one crib sheet, and a safe-sleep sack, and counsels parents on the dangers of co-sleeping. In addition to educating parents on safe sleep practices, the Safe Sleep Coordinator will educate community stakeholders, such as first responders and service providers, physicians and other medical personnel who interact with families.

Broward County's SWIM Central program works with Broward County Public Schools and child care centers to provide drowning prevention components, including:

- A minimum of six, and a maximum of 10, water safety lessons to participating children.
- A minimum of 25-30 minutes of water safety instruction per class with a maximum of 10 children per instructor.
- Water SMART Broward drowning prevention material, which includes water safety facts, data, and available resources. Additional educational classes are also offered to every family to provide basic water safety and drowning prevention information.
- In addition, the CSC funds coupons for free to low cost instruction for Broward's children 6-months through 4-years-old and the parent/caregiver of any child who redeems a child coupon is eligible to receive an adult coupon for themselves.

Broward Behavioral Health Coalition (BBHC) offers a Community Trauma Responsive Counseling Program that serves clients throughout Broward County that were affected by the mass shooting that occurred at Marjory Stoneman Douglas High School, COVID-19, and the deaths of students at Deerfield Beach High School. To support the recovery of those impacted by those tragedies, BBHC has subcontracted with several local mental health agencies to provide in-home trauma specific therapy by trained clinicians using: Trauma Focused Cognitive Behavioral Therapy (TF-CBT), Trauma Incident Reduction (TIR), Seeking Safety, Eye Movement Desensitization and Reprocessing (EMDR), or another Evidence-Based trauma specific therapeutic model.

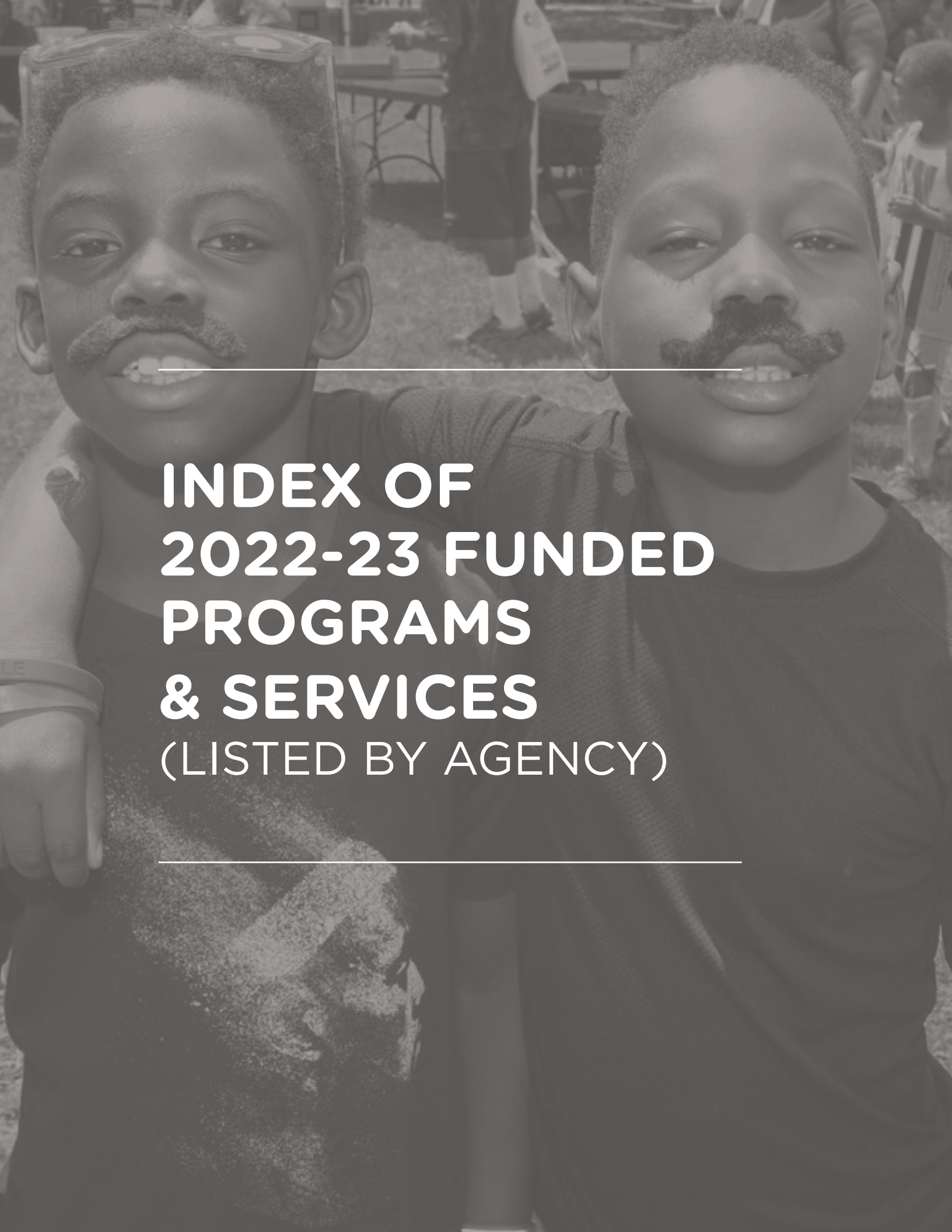
